Helping child survivors of critical illness using data

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Data-driven child support post-PICU

The sickest children in Australia are admitted to Paediatric Intensive Care Units (PICUs) and up to 60% have ongoing problems. Difficulties can be with the way they learn, play, or move and can sometimes last for months or years. This project will use data to uncover groups of child survivors of critical illness who have similar difficulties in the way they think, feel, or move during their first year of school. This will help flag which children admitted to PICU need ongoing care and support after their PICU stay and identify what type of follow up care will help the most.

 - Psychological children's emotional and social capabilities
- 3. What type of ongoing support would you find most beneficial after your child's PICU admission?
